Near Record Attendance at this year's COTS

Chapter Officer Training Seminar or COTS as we all know it by now, for 2005 took place in Columbus on December 4 and 5, 2004. For the uninitiated, COTS is held each year to provide training for chapter officers for the coming year. COTS is a Society activity hosted primarily in December and January throughout the country. All instructors are trained and certified by the Society. Classes are offered in the areas of the president, secretary, treasurer, marketing and public rela-

Some may consider these classes another of those well kept secrets in barbershopping, but in fact they are open to all and an authorized chapter expense. This year, according to Steve Wyszomierski, VP for chapter support and leadership training, without counting those district officers attending, there were 250 men registered.

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
The registration for this year set a new record in Johnny Appleseed District with 250 people registered for classes. Weather and other circumstances drove the actual attendance down a bit, but we still had 43 chapters with representatives up from 37 the year before. There were 173 students from those 43 chapters and that does not include District Officers in attendance at each class.

It seems we always get pumped up at COTS and ready to do all those things we hear about while there. So stand by for news.

The boards are now trained, ready, willing and able to do those things to make each chapter in the Johnny Appleseed District even greater. The danger lies in the very simple fact that they can't do it all alone, so when one of your officers calls upon you for help, do what you can. He

won't ask for more. On the other hand, if he gets no help or support from the general membership, a malaise can fall upon him pretty quickly. Let's not let that happen in this district. One of the many benefits we enjoy by being members of the Barbershop Harmony Society is education. Not only in our performance arts, but in our management skills. Attending COTS is just one of those opportunities and the returns are so great. Not only do we re-

ceive instruction that is supposedly proven and approved by the Society, but in a larger sense, we get to network with the guys in the trenches. Nearly all these fellows who attend COTS have been there before, either in the same office or a different one in their respective chapters. These are the real movers and shakers in our society, the guys in the trenches, and the ones who really make it happen. And they are willing to share.COTS is open to all and a legitimate Chapter expense. Registration includes

State of the District Address

Presented at Chapter Operations Training Seminar December 4, 2004

I was sitting in the Choral Activities Room at Bowling Green State University. It was my final audition to join Yesteryear. After singing for the guys on a few other occasions as they evaluated a number of different singers, this time was a little different. Danny, Rod and Beef wanted to talk about the future. "What would you like to accomplish as a quartet singer?" they asked me. "Well, I'd like to win a gold medal someday!" I was told upfront in no uncertain terms that Yesteryear would never achieve that goal...maybe I should look somewhere else! Well, the rest is history as they say. The point of this opening illustration is simple – dreams can come true!

Let's begin this morning by looking at the condition of the Johnny Appleseed District. Competitively

speaking we have two fine choruses including an International Medalist competing in Salt Lake City. We just sent six quartets to Louisville and I imagine we'll send at least six to Salt Lake City! We have an excellent school in Top Gun with some of the finest coaches in the Society. We continue to hold superior conventions in the Fall and Spring; however, I would note that the Events team has already begun to work on much needed improvements in a number of areas related to the contests that occur at our Spring and Fall conventions. The Buckeye Invitational has established itself as a mainstay on the Societywide calendar.

Recreationally we've enjoyed events like the Buckeye Invitational, the Xenia Corn Roast, and Middle Bass Weekend.

By the Numbers we have seen a continued decline in membership and a continued decline in financial resources.

"From my gut" I have to say that there seems to be a communication gap be-

tween the District leadership and Joe Barbershopper. Perhaps there's even distrust by our chapters of anything that doesn't originate in the chapter. There is certainly a level of frustration by District leaders by what is

CSLT VP Steve Wyszomierski, has organized some of the most successful COTS events in the Society. C&J VP **Jim Ramsey** has been responsible for making JAD one of the most requested contest locations in the C&J program for judges. Secretary **Ken** Stevens suffered many long, hard hours listening to tapes to prepare minutes of HOD and Board meetings. Treasurer/CFO Don Winterhalter has been an incredibly active and effective Treasurer. IPP Lane Bushong has been willing to take on any special project asked of him, in-

cluding continuing to handle the Lakeside Show. Board members at large **Ron Sykes** and Greg Batchelor have provided tremendous insight and effort to the Board in its planning processes. And interim Cider Press Editor Ted May, who has done a terrific job with the Cider Press during his short tenure. Gentlemen, I salute you and suggest that we all do the same when we see them next for their service to our great

The second purpose is to tell you I just returned hours ago from an incredibly exciting leadership training meeting for Harmony Foundation in Chicago. Talk about possibility thinking! I will be working in 2005 to develop a strategic plan for external District grant needs as well as programs to increase our own participation in Harmony Foundation. Men, there is more potential to "chase the dream," not only in Johnny Appleseed District but all over the Society, through a unified national program of fundraising than there will ever be if we continue to seek grants and gifts at the local and even District levels. The single obstacle Harmony Foundations faces, and will overcome with our help, is the need for participation by our own membership. Only 3 percent of our members contribute to Harmony Foundation. The national average participation in non-profit organizations is 19 percent. Fellas, when we raise our participation level Society wide to that level, two exciting things happen. We will create an annual operating fund of \$1,000,000 that can be used for all of the YMIH camps and director development workshops we can produce! And, once WE support ourselves at that level, the door is opened wide for major granting organizations throughout the US to award us grants. We need to be supporting ourselves at the 19% level to get in the door to those organizations. I can't tell you how thrilled I am to be working to make that kind of difference in our hobby, and in the lives of the tens of thousands of kids we can reach through this effort. You'll be hearing lots more from me on this issue, and I look forward with unbelievable enthusiasm and passion to us chasing this dream together in 2005!

Chapters are responsible for contacting their quartets ASAP and negotiating the contract for the performance sometime in 2005. If you are not the chapter contact, please forward this message to them. By participating in the Lottery, performers have offered one fee-free performance to the winning chapter; all other expenses need to be negotiated between the chapter and performer. Most of these arrangements over the past few years have occurred without many problems; everyone is interested in making a good-faith effort to carry out their obligations and not take advantage of the performers. Please note that the district is now out of the loop – whatever happens with these negotiations is between the chapter and the per-

former. If the performer that your chapter won folds before you can negotiate a contract with them, that's just a part of the luck of the draw. It happens. "Better luck next year" is REALLY the best I can say. If you need contact information, it is available from the district website for chapters or you can contact me for quartet contacts and I will provide an email address or phone number

You are all responsible for raising \$1100 for the JAD Young Men in Harmony Program for 2005. We greatly appreciate that. Thanks to all the performers for participating this year, and congratulations to all the winners! Good luck with your show, concert, public performance, or other such event.

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

Marketing Is Job One!



By: R.F. Miller – DVP M&PR In April of 2000, I became a barbershopper in the Mansfield, Ohio chapter, the Fun Center Chordsmen. My musical background had been play-

ing trumpet in high school and college and singing in church choirs most of my life. And so it was that I put on "rookie stripes" in the world of barbershopping. So I'm now wearing my JAD "rookie stripes" for the next year. That being said, you can see that my barbershop administration knowledge and experience may be somewhat limited.

However, we know, as members of the Barbershop Harmony Society, we must change the way we do things if we are to stem the tide of membership decline. The Johnny Appleseed District (JAD) must do things a little differently as well.

This is, perhaps, where I can use my background and experience to good advantage. I spent the 32 years of my active work life in the Sales, Marketing and PR functions of two major telephony organizations. During those years, I saw the telephony industry go from a regulated to a de-regulated environment. If you don't think that took a major paradigm shift, think again. So change is nothing new to me. We can work through the change the Society is implementing and come out the other side much stronger.

Marketing is sometimes described as the "act of moving the product from the producer to the consumer." We, as individuals and choruses, are the producers of the product—the four part barbershop harmony sound. In order for the consumer to desire to purchase our product, we must produce good solid harmony. Assuming that is the case, how do we stimulate demand for our product? Right now, the supply probably outweighs the demand in most chapter areas.

Each member of the JAD can become a "marketing guy," and begin to spread the word. When was the last time you told someone how much fun and exciting it is to sing in an a cappella chorus? Simply by being willing to mention the subject, discuss it and invite a guest to your chorus rehearsal, is a step in the right direction. It may also generate additional performances for your chorus.

As your new VP of Marketing and Public Relations, I pledge to you, I'll do whatever I can to assist the chapters and their M&PR guys. There are no bad ideas—just some better than others. If you have a Marketing or PR idea, please share it with me. There are probably other chapters that could make use of it.

I don't have all the answers, but I'm willing to work with any marketing or public relations concerns you may have. At COTS, we heard **Mark Blake** comment on the marketing and PR job we did in Mansfield when he became our director. It's not that difficult but it does take commitment and dedication.

I look forward to working with all the Chapters. Together we can make a difference. Marketing is my Job One!

perceived to be a lack of cooperation from the chapters. What to do...?

- Certainly first on the list is to continue to do what we have always done well. Our training programs are top notch, but they can be better. Top Gun will continue to prepare our finest quartets and choruses for stellar performances at our International contests. Apple Corps, as good as it is, can be improved. Apple Corps is currently being evaluated and I look forward to hearing good things from Darryl Flinn, Herb Shreffler, and their team.
- Many other chapter-sponsored events occur every year that encourage fellowship and recreational singing in the JAD. However, let me say that as the incoming District President, one of my primary goals will be to appoint a study group who will take on the task of transforming our conventions into events that include not just some of the finest competitive units in the Society, but also activities for the barbershop singer, quartet, and chorus whose goals don't include winning an International Gold Medal.
- My hope is that future conventions will include festival-like activities that allow all of our 2400 members, and their families, to enjoy a mass gathering in their District. Our conventions could include events such as mass sings, chorus festivals, and shows where non-competitors and competitors alike share their music with our convention crowds and perhaps even members of the sponsoring chapter's community.
- Our conventions could include training events for chorus directors, section leaders, emerging leaders, coaches, and chapter leaders.
- I look forward to what I think will be an inspiring new direction for ALL members of our JAD family.
- Fred Pummill has already begun to aggressively search out opportunities to improve the membership situation in the District. I will support his fresh perspective and impassioned efforts in the hope of creating new chapters that bring new opportunities for growth in our hobby. I will continue to support the ongoing effort by all of the DVPs to meet with, encourage and challenge struggling chapters to recover and prosper.
- Our ability to improve our conventions, aggressively pursue opportunities for membership development, and provide more educational opportunities to our chapters depends largely on our ability to increase our revenues. I am pleased to continue working with Don Winterhalter, our Treasurer and Chief Financial Officer, on finding opportunities to improve the profitability of our existing activities. I will also be working with Skipp Kropp, our newly appointed Vice-President of Financial Development, to bring outside resources into the District budget. As well, we will look to a renewed effort in grant writing at the Chapter and District levels to increase the amount of financial resources available to us.
- Finally, it seems to me that the difficulty at getting the "us" and "them" mentality that exists among so many in our District to morph into a "we're in

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this together" perspective depends largely on communication and visibility. To that end, it seems that if we don't accomplish anything else at the District level in 2005, we have to improve the visibility of our leaders, counselors, and message. The Board of Directors has appointed a task force to consider the possibility of re-establishing the six Divisions that once served us so well, including the appointment or election of Division Managers or Vice-Presidents. I am working with Chapter Support & Leadership Training to increase the number of Chapter Counselors dramatically and to provide a new oversight system so that they can accomplish the work of helping member chapters. We continue to work to improve the tools for communication at the District level. After the fine service of such men as Dick Stuart and Ted May as Cider Press editors, Bill Evans from the Greater Kanawha Valley Chapter takes the reins of The Cider Press. Reid Joyce continues to work at making the District website, www.singjad.com, the most valuable resource for information and instruction that it can possibly be. We will do what needs to be done to have a closer relationship with each chapter in the JAD.

A few years ago Dave Kracker, the founding director of the Mansfield FunCenter Chordmen, approached me. Knowing that I lived in a community just twenty minutes away from Mansfield, he asked if I would consider becoming the new chorus director of the chapter. The chapter had fallen on hard times and was near death. They needed something quick and Dave was hoping new blood was the answer. I agreed to give it a try and results were miraculous. This small chapter made me feel like a hero every week. They encouraged me and prodded me on to be my best. They publicized the presence of an International Champion at every opportunity. I think I appeared on every imaginable form of media in the area – newspaper, radio, and even television! On our first major guest night we saw forty guests! And, a bunch of them "stuck." Today, the Mansfield Chapter is one of the healthiest in the JAD. They are involved in their community, they enjoy the fellowship of barbershop harmony, and they compete in District contests for the sake of improving their craft. They have managed to attract one of the District's most gifted chorus directors, Steve Kovach, and they continue to grow. Today, one of their own, Bob Miller, will be serving the JAD as the Vice-President of Marketing & Public Relations. Dave Kracker and the guys in Mansfield had a dream...and they made it come true!

Gentlemen, it is often said that if anything is to happen in our great Society, it will happen at the Chapter level. I believe strongly that this is true. Our Society Board of Directors and Society Staff are pursuing new and bold avenues of opportunity to improve the visibility of Barbershop Harmony at the continental level...all across North America. The JAD Board of Directors and District Management Team will work harder and smarter to create opportunities for success...whatever that means to your chapter. But the reality is this – no matter what the Society does, no matter what the District does – your success depends on you. If you want to be the hotbed for good singing and fellowship in the ring of clubs that exist in your community, you're going to have to be one of the most attractive clubs in your town. If you want to win a gold medal, you're going to have to get the singers, the music, the coaching, and the money.

Gentlemen, my dream is that we will build a team out of Society, District, and Chapter resources that will allow you to succeed at whatever you and your Chapter want to be.

I hope you'll work with us, and let us work with you.



Make YMIH a Part of your Chapter's Success

The YMIH class saw 13 guys at COTS the weekend of December 4-5. I hope I was able to provide some encour-



aging words and support materials for the group. I know Al Bonney, the instructor, passed on some great materials and perspectives; and the class attendees shared some great experiences.

One of the notes I made during class had to do with how we measure the success of the YMIH Program in JAD. We measure it by the number of youth we expose to Barbershop Harmony or, in general, vocal music. This includes "youth" from ages 5 to 25. We also measure the number of music educators exposed to the style of music we know and love, and the number of them with whom we have established a relationship of some sort. This means that they have repeatedly invited us into their classrooms (because they trust us) or have enlisted our help with their own music programs.

Note that I did NOT mention as a measurement the number of students who join our chapters. That's not what we're trying to do. Sure, many of our chapters have youth singing with them as members, but those that do are not using their YMIH Program to recruit these young men. They don't even mention membership at their high school visitations. They leave that up to the students themselves to ask. And that's as it should be.

A word of warning: if you're trying to use YMIH to recruit new, younger singers, that's not what it's for. It won't be successful. You'll only alienate the teacher and jeopardize the students' development and education. It's a serious risk with serious consequences for you and your future relationship with that teacher and that school. I'm not just saying that, it's true. There have been chapters that have turned teachers against us just by trying to recruit their kids. And once the teacher was lost, that chapter never had another chance with students from that school.

The District's SWOT Analyses (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats) suggest that every successful chapter has both an internal focus and an external focus. The internal focus is on their music, membership, finances and other such essential operating activities. The external focus is usually carried out either as a partnership in the arts in their community or through their YMIH program and their work with youth and music educators.

Remember the three steps to success: 1) Assess your chapter strengths, 2) Identify the teacher's needs, and 3) Find a fit between the two.

Your chapter can be as successful as you want to be - make YMIH a part of that success!

CDWI planned for April, '05.

Once again, the Independence Chapter has agreed to host a CDWI, or Chorus Directors Workshop Intensive, for spring '05. The dates are April 23 **OR** April 30. (More information will follow as trainers are selected)

The CDWI is designed to give directors of ALL skill levels an opportunity to improve as the musical leader of a barbershop chorus. CDWI is absolutely the most successful training tool offered by our society. Over 600 directors have attended a CDWI since its inception.

This one-day workshop is awesome. It provides the directors with insight into their purpose for directing and provides private instruction, in front of a chorus, with a instructor, specially trained in helping a director get the most improvement from themselves and their chorus. CDWI is one of the few programs that a director can attend more than once. It is not a "been there, done that" type of experience. It is part of what Bill Rashleigh calls, "Lifelong Learning" for directors, because each time a director attends, he can work on different aspects of his directing skills.
